

Hyperbole is a type of figurative language, where an idea, action, situation or feeling is exaggerated in order to emphasise a point or create humour. It also helps to create an image in the reader's mind by over-emphasising something through the use of extreme language.

Because it is a type of figurative language, it is not literal and so cannot actually happen.

Hyperbole makes the action or emotion seem more dramatic than it actually is!

# It feels like next weekend is never going to arrive. My brother is stronger than iron! Your brain is the size of a pea. I've read this magazine a hundred times.

We use this expression to show that someone is really angry but it is impossible for steam to come out of a human's ears!



#### Hyperbole

Hyperbole is an exaggeration used for emphasis or humour. It is often used to make a certain element of a story seem more interesting.

e.g. I was bored to tears.
