Personification is a type of figurative language.


It is when an animal, plant or non-living object is given human characteristics.

These might include emotions, sensations, physical movements or speech.


#### example

Lightning danced across the sky.

Lightning can't really dance but this helps to create the impression that the lightning is **moving quickly and rhythmically.**

### b) The wind shrieked menacingly as it raced through the abandoned woods.

Humans shriek and race. The wind is not able to do these things as it is not a human.

c) The fire <u>choked</u> the forest with its colossal flames.


Choking requires the use of hands but a fire doesn't have hands.
